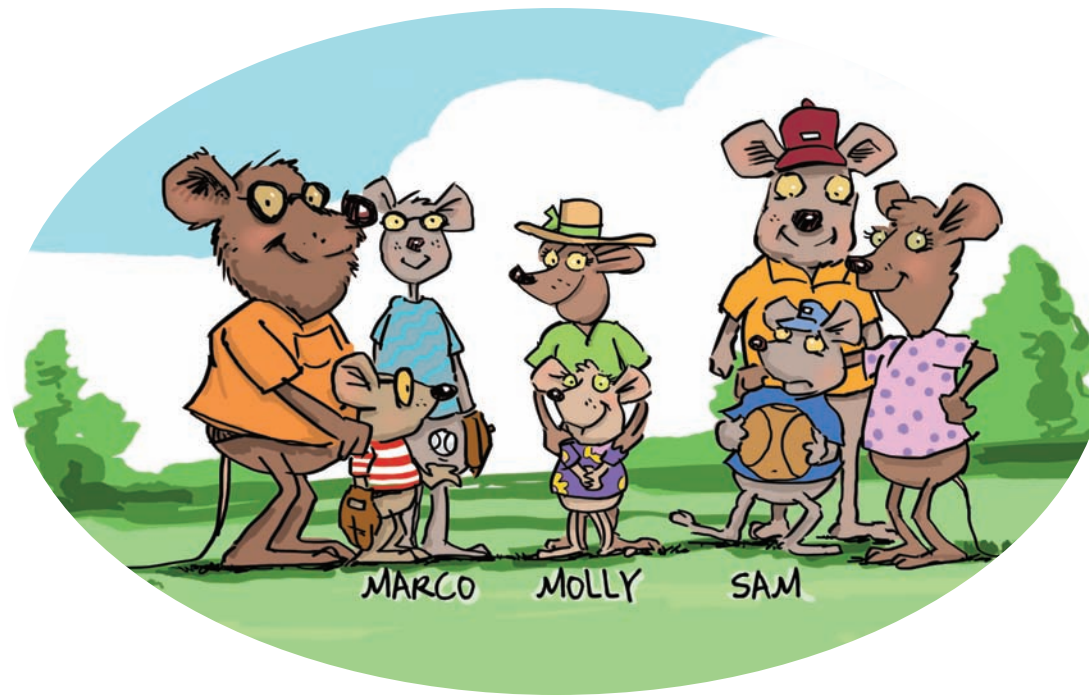

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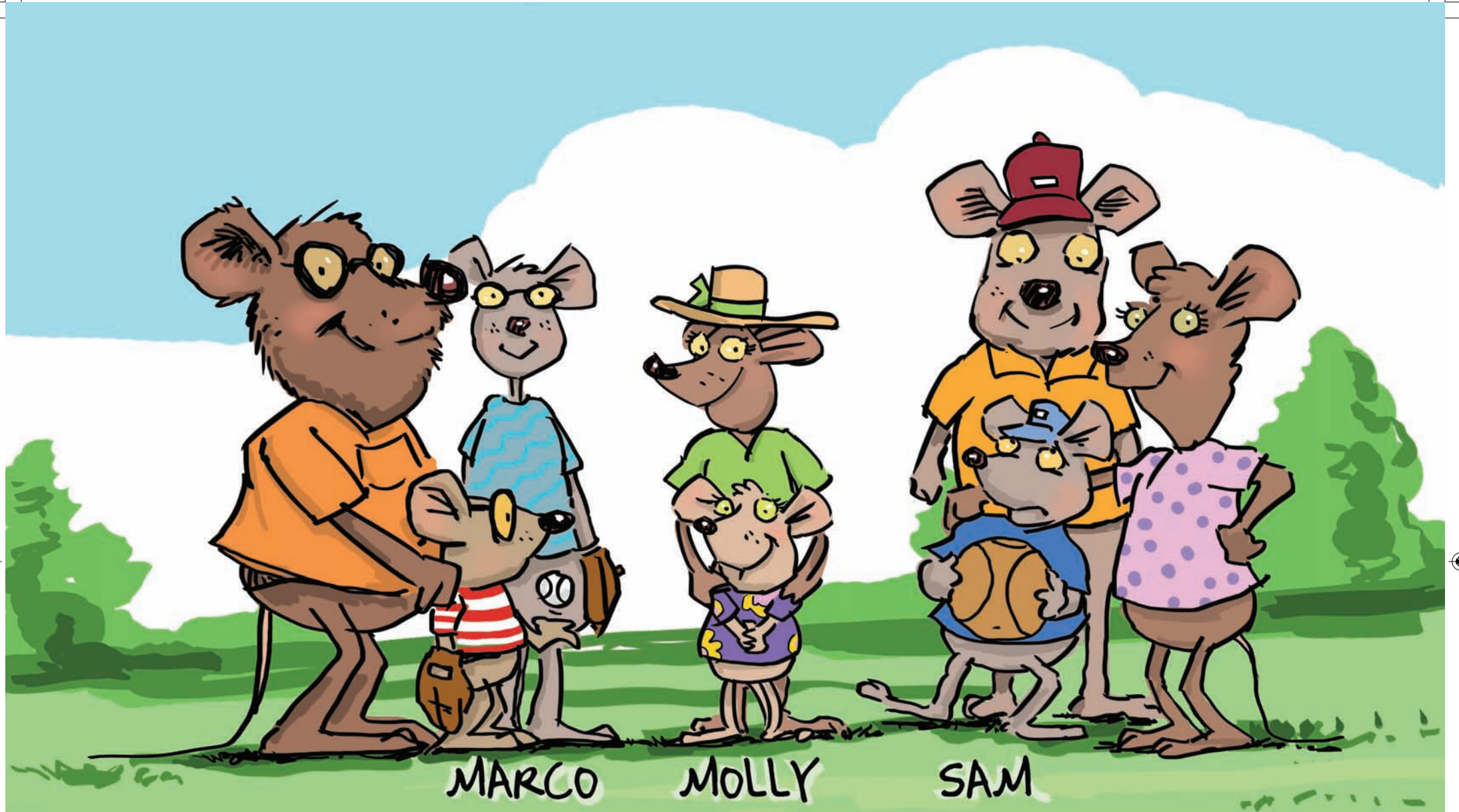




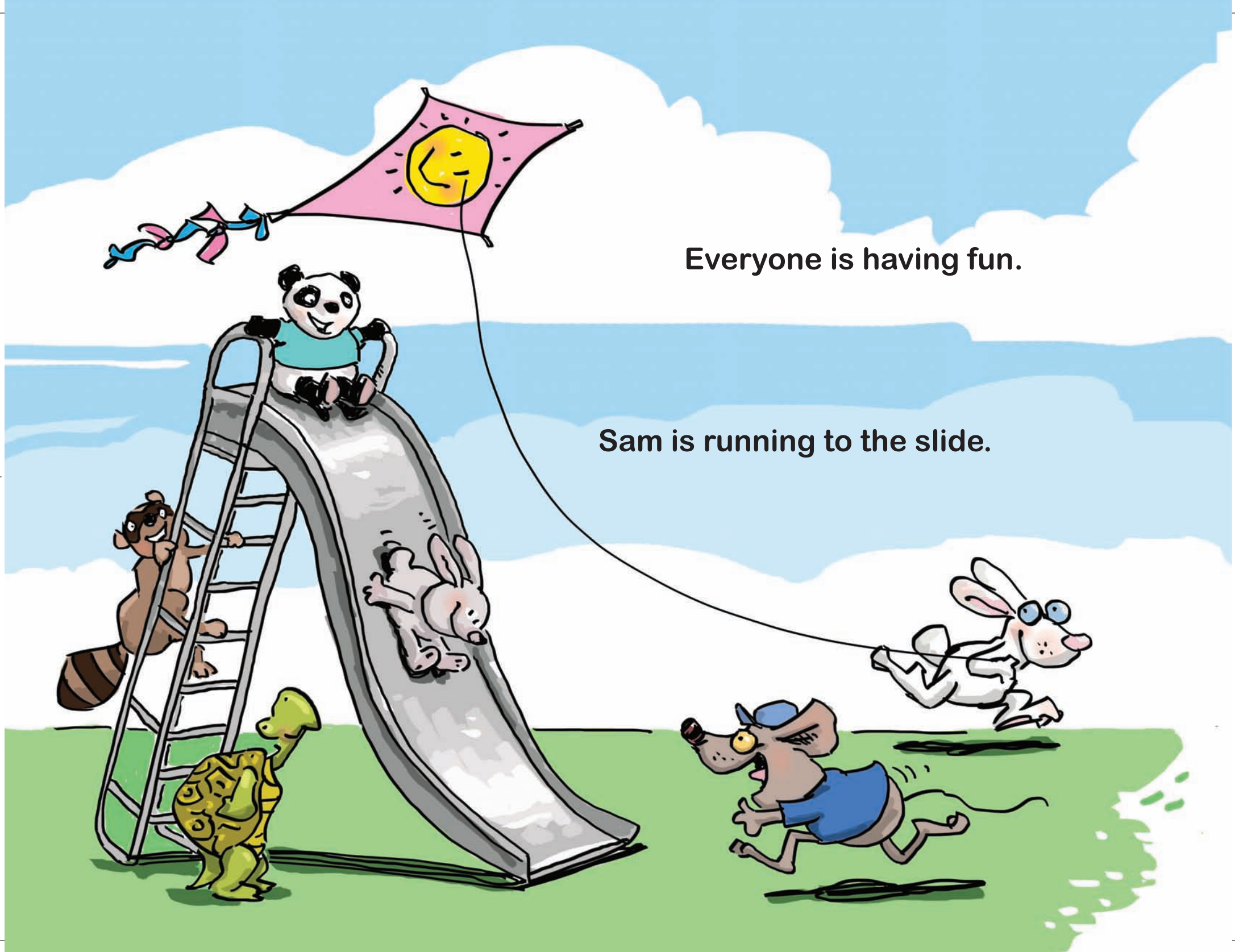

Marco, Molly and Sam are at the park for Family Fun Day.

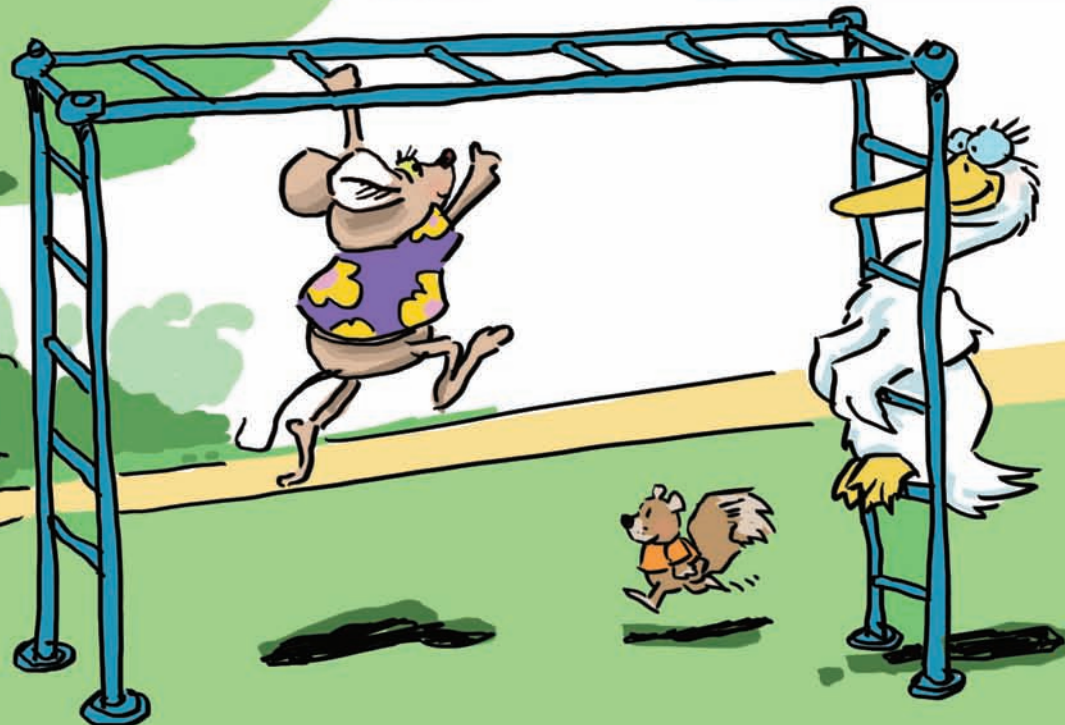


Everyone is having fun.

Marco is busy swinging.

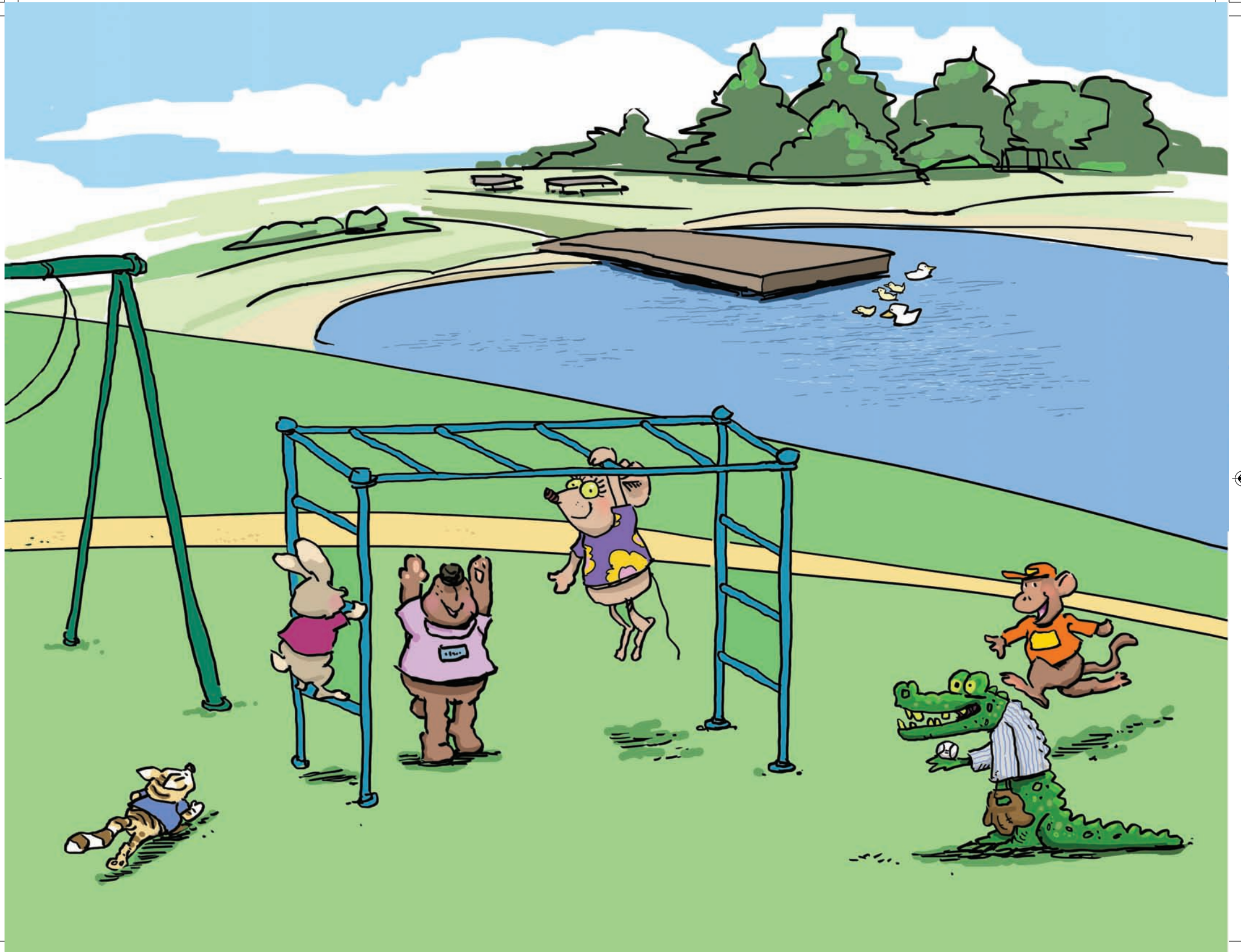


Molly is playing on the monkey bars.

“My mom told me not to go near the water,” says Molly.

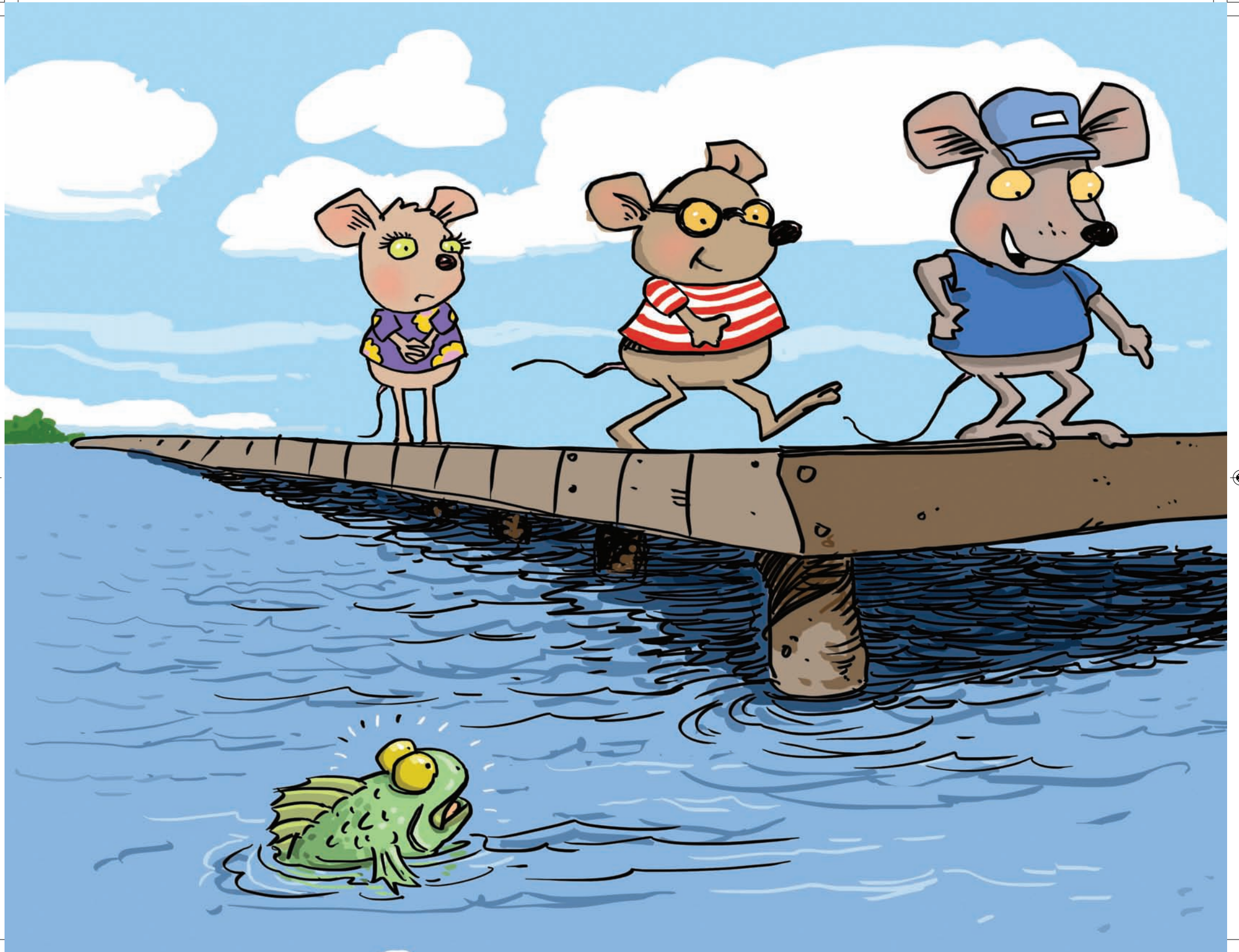


“Oh, come on! It’ll be fun. I’ll race you there!” shouts Sam.

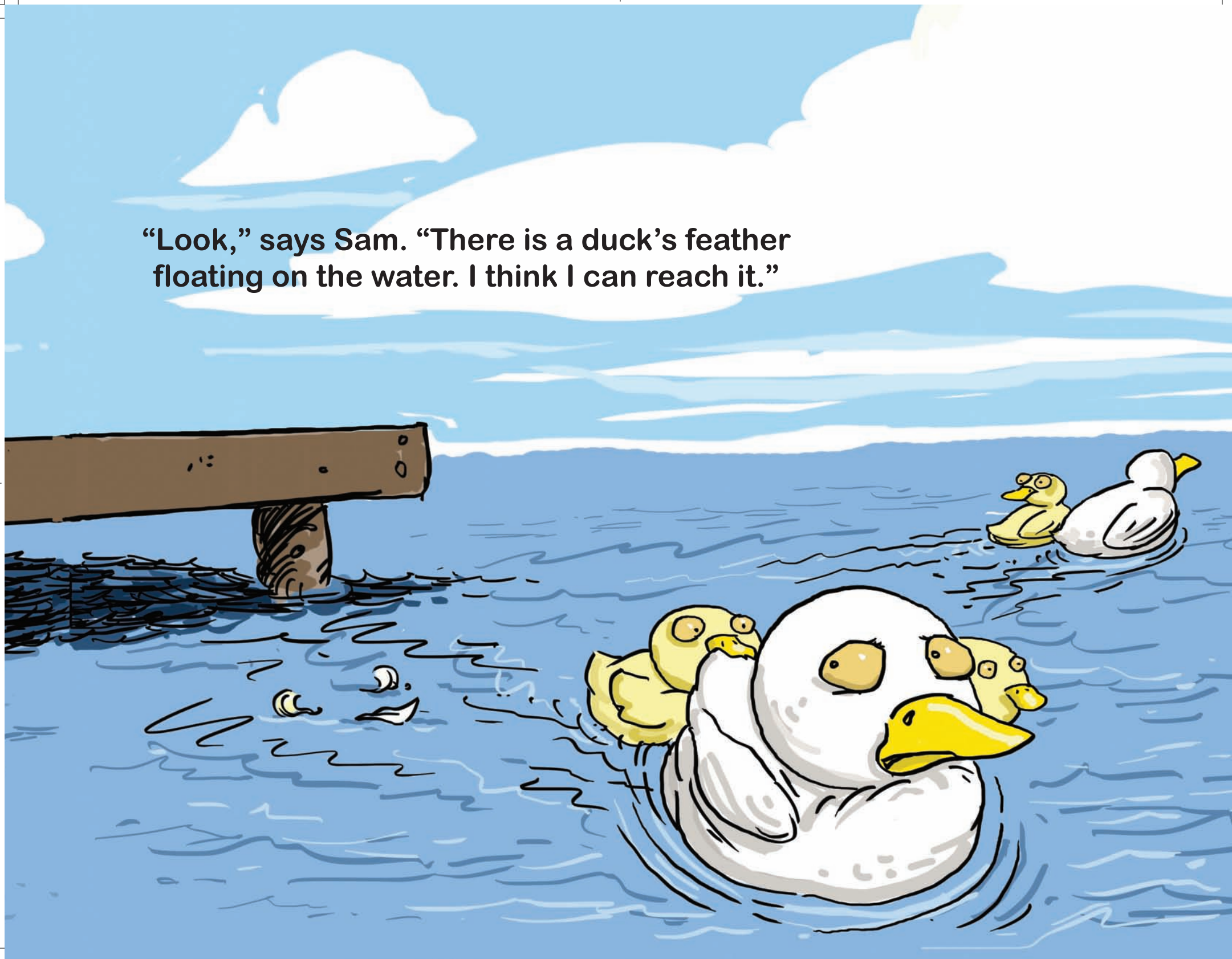




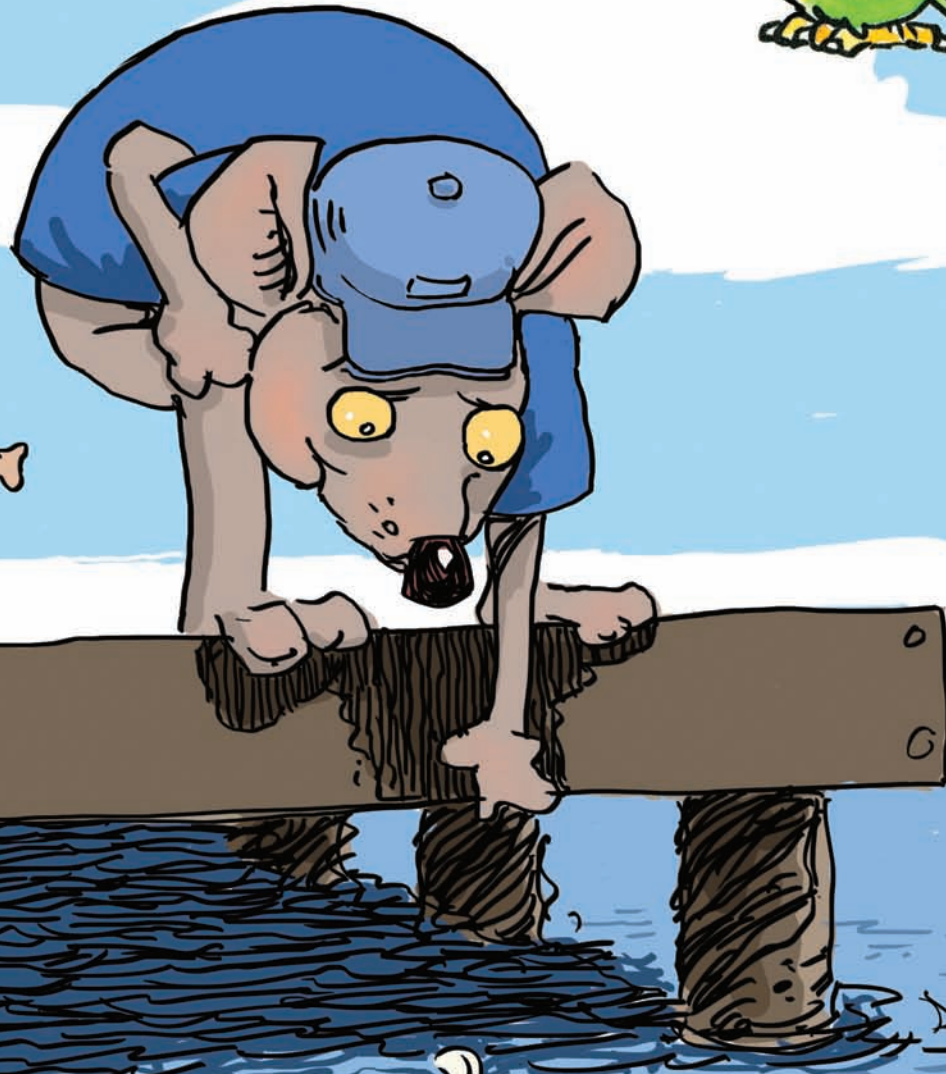
All three friends race to the lake.

See It!

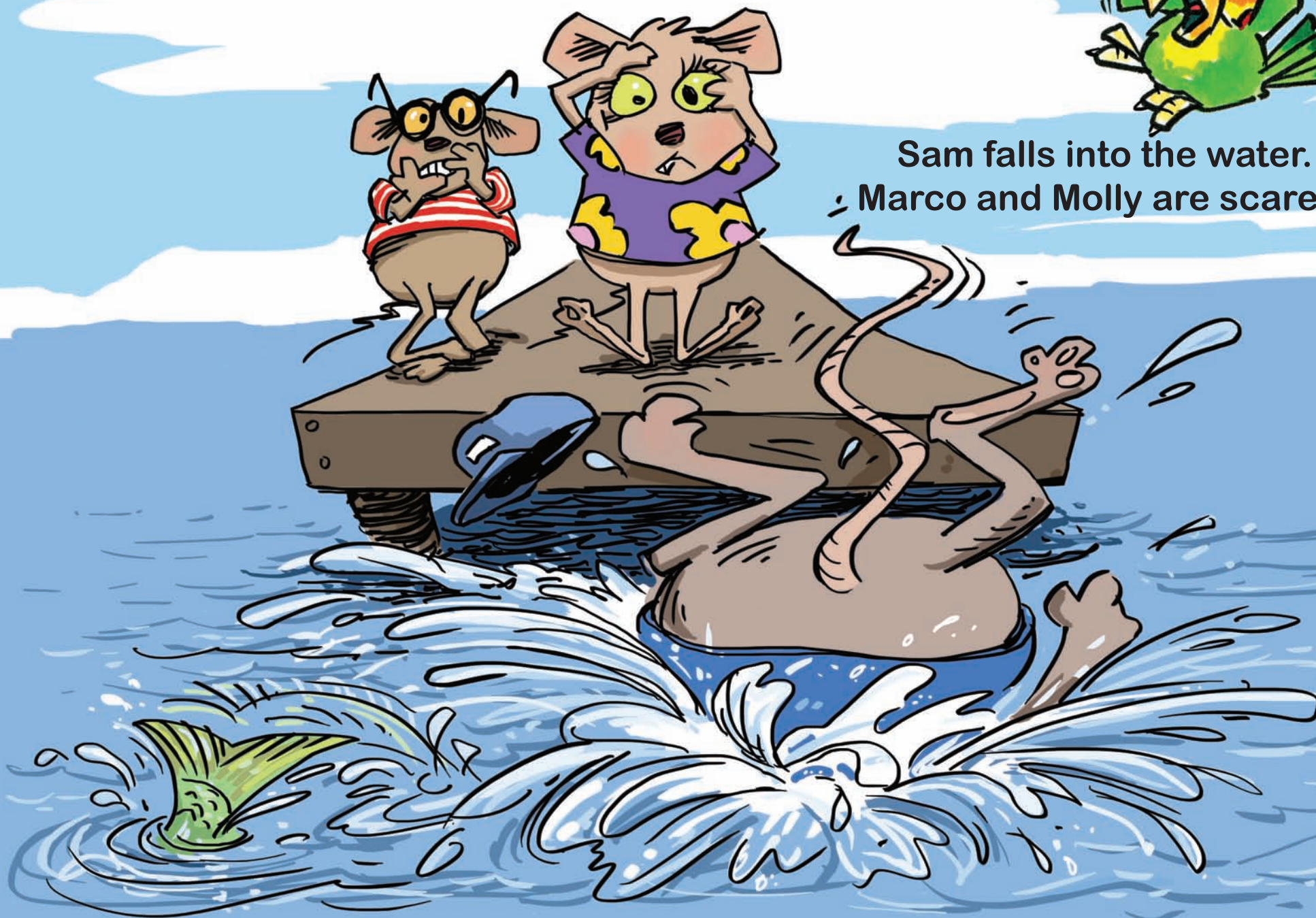


Marco and Molly see their friend is in trouble.

Molly yells, "HELP!" as loud as she can.



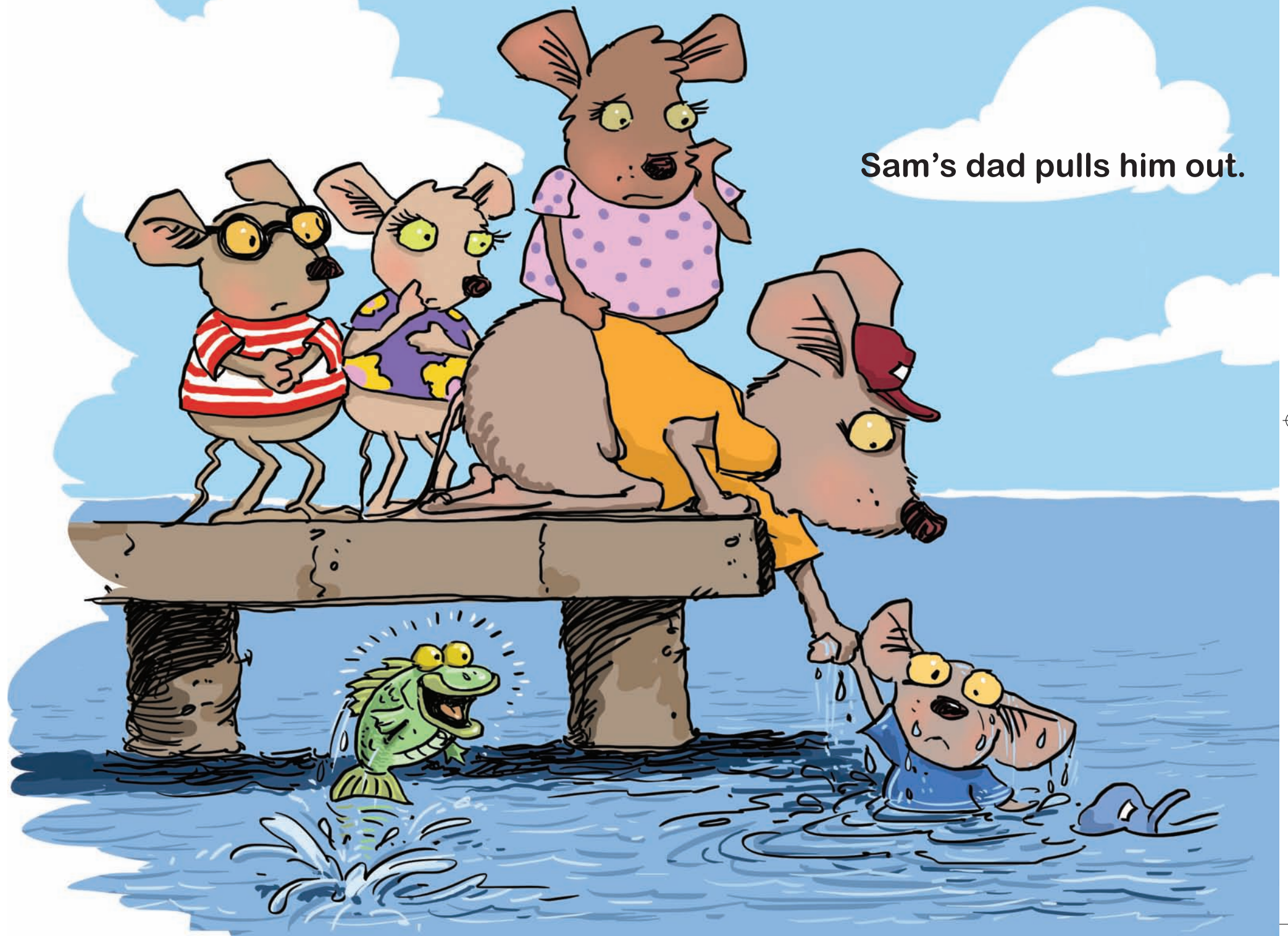
Tell!

4. Tell: Tell someone right away.

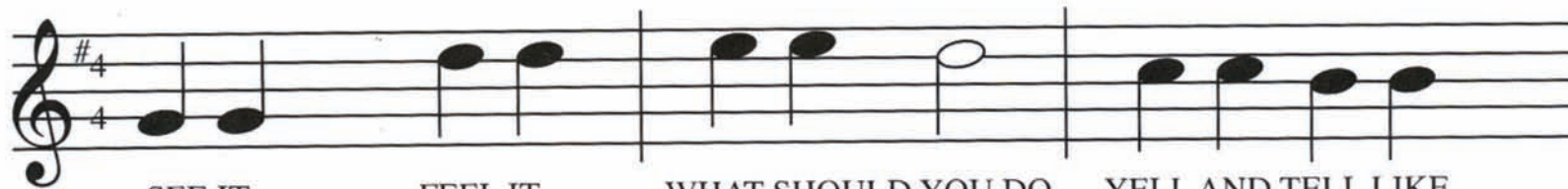

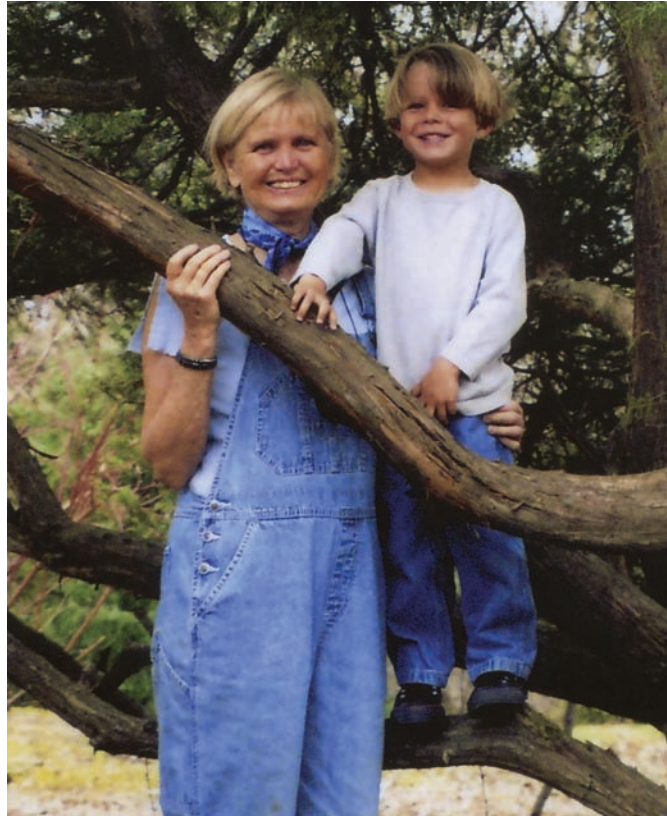
